The State Transportation Board met in official session for a study session at 9:45 a.m., Friday, February 1, 2002, with Chairperson Dusenberry presiding. Other Board members present included: Vice Chairperson Ingo Radicke, Rusty Gant, Dick Hileman, Bill Jeffers, Joe Lane, and Jim Martin. Also present were Director Victor Mendez; Dick Wright, State Engineer; John McGee, Chief Financial Officer, Administrative Services Division; and Mary Lynn Tischer, Director, Planning Division;. There were approximately 30 people in the audience.

Chairperson Dusenberry called the meeting to order.

Mr. Mendez announced Debra Brisk was selected as the new Deputy Director, effective February 16, 2002.

### **Revenue Projections Overview**

Mr. John McGee noted they will bring a slightly amended resolution forward at the next Board meeting. He explained they were unable to do the refunding they anticipated doing as part of the \$76 million HURF issue because combining the projects did not generate the expected level of savings.

Mr. McGee updated members on the status of funding for the FY 2003-2007 Highway Program. He said the situation has changed dramatically since the revenue forecasts were first approved in July. He explained they originally recommended a borrowing reserve of \$100 million to cover four major contingencies; in this state, DPS funding, Federal funds, and HURF Funds.

Mr. McGee reported the Appeals Court agreed with ADOT on the Hurley Trucking case and remanded the case back to Tax Court. He explained the Plaintiffs now have either 15 days to request the Appeals Court to reconsider or 30 days to take it to the Supreme Court.

Mr. McGee stated DPS funding has taken more in Highway funds than projected in the original RAAC estimate for 2003-2007. He said the Governor has called another special session to deal with continuing to find General Fund Revenues in the 2002 budget. He explained part of the Governor's proposal calls for an additional \$10 million in funding from HURF for FY 2002 and \$20 million from HURF for FY 2001. He stated approximately 50 percent of those funds would

be borne by ADOT. He anticipated seeing similar levels for FY 2003 and higher than normal levels for several years into the future.

Mr. McGee stated HURF Revenues were reduced by \$186 million for FY 2002 – 2007 based on FY 2001 growth rates and similar growth rates for FY 2003. He noted ADOT would bear approximately 50 percent of the shift.

Mr. McGee said the most difficult part of the five year forecast of estimated funds is in the area of Federal Funds. He reviewed the “Revenue Aligned Budget Authority” calculation worksheet as amended by TEA 21 and the TEA21 Restoration Act. He said, prior to the September 11<sup>th</sup> attack, ASHTO sent out a notification indicating preliminary information suggested the 2003 RABA distribution could end up being a negative number. He said they received notification three weeks ago that the amount could be as much as -\$2.5 billion, but the actual number that came out almost two weeks ago turned out to be -\$5 billion. He explained the decrease is tied to actual receipts over the last three years, noting in 1999 the Highway Trust Fund took in \$33.8 billion as compared to \$30.3 billion in 2000 and \$26.9 billion in 2001. He said the reason for the decline in revenue is unclear at this time, pointing out most states have actually seen marginal growth in their transportation taxes. He stated ASHTO has asked to have the General Accounting Office look at the numbers and report back as to their findings. He said that report is expected to be completed in mid-February. Mr. McGee explained their original calculations projected total state distributions to be approximately \$32.1 billion, however, the reduction brought the national program down to approximately \$22.8 billion. He said Arizona’s share of the -\$5 billion RABA distribution would total \$75 million, resulting in Arizona receiving approximately \$357 million for FY 2003. He reviewed two methodologies for Federal Funds Estimates and Discretionary Fund Analyses of Major Funding Changes. He stated he is currently considering whether or not the Board should borrow the remaining \$100 million, reminding members that the portion of the Call Provision bill that would have increased the Board’s bonding cap was stripped. He identified the main issues as being 1) the long-term estimate of federal funds, 2) the impact of the BFO “call provision” on BFO borrowings, 3) a GAN capacity reduction, 4) GAN project accelerations, 5) the impact of revenue decreases on RFS acceleration commitments, 6) the impact of federal funds cuts on MAG Federal Aid commitments, 7) an inflation factor adjustment and 8) the HURF bonding cap increase. He said he believes they have good support at the Legislature to get the HURF bonding cap increased to \$1.3 billion, which could help mitigate some of the impacts.

In response to Mr. Martin’s question, Mr. McGee stated they currently have approximately \$66 million in HURF bonds issued in 1999 that generate a level of savings, noting they have until 2009 to refund those bonds. He said the amendment to the bond authorization would allow them to go forward with a refund for those bonds.

A member asked if it is possible HELP loans would not get repaid if HURF funding is decreased. Mr. McGee said it could hinder some of the smaller entities in repaying their loans, but he does not consider it a big issue.

Mr. Mendez stated they actively manage the program and have saved \$56 million over the years through refinancing.

A Member asked if the increase in automobile travelers, versus air travelers, has been factored into the formulation. Mr. McGee said there has been some offset. A Member asked if increasing the Board's bonding cap would resolve issues today, but create issues in the future. Mr. McGee noted only 20 percent of the current five year program is financed through some sort of bonding.

Chairperson Dusenberry asked what the shortfall would do to the acceleration commitments for the Regional Transportation Plan. Mr. McGee said it would depend on the size of the shortfall, but, in his opinion, it would not delay the 2007 date.

Ms. Tischer stated that, because of financial difficulties in estimating the amount of the program, they are delaying bringing forward a tentative draft five year program. She said they are looking for results of the General Accounting Office's audit and any additional information they can obtain to help make that determination. She said, unfortunately, they will not know about certain elements for quite a while, therefore, best estimates will have to be used.

Ms. Tischer reviewed their recommended strategies, stating the first is to consider moving projects that are not ready to advertise in the fiscal year they are programmed. She noted a Technical Committee is overseeing the development of the Five-Year Program.

Mr. Radicke asked if the need for a project, even if it cannot be advertised in the fiscal year programmed, will be taken into consideration. Ms. Tischer responded yes.

Ms. Tischer said the second recommendation is to consider moving projects that they know will need a significant increase in funding to be feasible. She stated they will also look at sub programs to determine if certain elements can be moved. She said they are recommending that projects that are a result of commitments, such as IGA's, and program shares recommended by RAAC and approved by the Board be retained. She identified balancing the district work force and developing a prioritized list of projects to reprogram as funding becomes available as additional considerations. She noted a RAAC meeting, scheduled for later today, will discuss the issue of how shortfalls will be shared among MAG, PAG and the rest of the state.

Ms. Tischer reviewed considerations for determining whether a project is a high priority: 1) the project is located on a corridor of statewide significance; 2) the project is located in a high-crash or congested location; 3) there are significant continuing maintenance costs; 4) the project provides a large "bang for the buck"; 5) the project is part of an important program, such as pavement preservation; and 6) the project was originally scheduled to occur in an earlier year, but was ultimately moved out.

Ms. Tischer confirmed for Mr. Martin that their goal is to achieve as many efficiencies as possible.

Mr. Radicke stressed the importance of maintaining existing roadways.

In response to Mr. Gant's question, Ms. Tischer stated MAG understands the kind of shortfalls they are facing and have postponed developing their program until they get a better understanding of the financial situation.

Mr. Radicke asked Ms. Tischer to brief the Board as to what RAAC is discussing with regard to the shortfall. Ms. Tischer said the recommendation put on the table at the last RAAC meeting was that the shortfall would be shared in proportion to the share of the program. She explained that for the first year of the RABA increase they essentially used the funding to pay for cost increases in statewide projects. She said it was determined that they would give the additional funding to MAG and PAG for the second year and, from then on, it would be shared proportionally.

Mr. Tom Swanson/PAG, said ADOT staff has done a good job of communicating with MAG. He said MAG members have discussed the need to carry on with environmental studies and right-of-way acquisitions on projects, even though the project might be delayed because it will not be ready to advertise in the fiscal year programmed.

Mr. Radicke asked Ms. Tischer what the Board could do to obtain more Federal Highway Trust funds to maintain current projects. Ms. Tischer said the Governor, as Chair of the Western Governor's Association, addressed a letter to the Secretary and ASHTO asked each state to identify the potential impacts of the RABA cuts.

Mr. Mendez reported the letter from the Governor is still in draft form and Mr. John Carlson will be providing the Board with a package of information. He noted the Hoover Dam Bypass is a second effort undertaken by the Governor. He stated ASHTO will hold a Washington brief February 21 through March 1, providing an opportunity to meet with members of the Congressional Delegation. He suggested that would be a good time to deliver a letter from the Board outlining the Board's concerns. He recommended the Board focus their comments on how the state's transportation system as a whole will be effected.

### **Policy Committee Report**

Ms. Tischer provided a brief overview of the draft Transportation Board Policies.

Mr. Radicke pointed out there was no mention of aeronautical policies. Ms. Tischer said they were recently taken through an aeronautics policy update, which will be added as an addendum.

Ms. Tischer stated the policies would not go out for public review until they have received feedback from the Board.

Ms. Tischer asked the Board to submit its comments and questions before the end of February.

The meeting recessed for lunch.

## Legislative Overview

The meeting resumed at 1:00 p.m.

Mr. Biesty updated the Board on currently proposed legislation affecting transportation issues. He said things are quiet in terms of committees, however there have been meetings regarding the stimulus package and TEA 21. He said FHWA has put the RABA issue in the hands of Congress and has not set forth any plans to address the shortfalls.

Chairperson Dusenberry asked who are the key Congressional players in terms of transportation. Mr. Biesty said Senator Max Boccus has been very vocal on the issue of additional obligation authority.

Mr. Radicke asked if there have been discussions about taking money from other areas. Mr. Biesty said the \$20 billion trust fund has been mentioned as an option. Mr. Mendez said USDOT's position is that the trust fund money is needed for current obligations. He said the question is whether they need to hold the entire \$20 billion in reserve.

Chairperson Dusenberry stressed the importance of keeping the state legislators updated on the situation. Mr. Biesty stated letters have been sent from the Governor's office apprising Legislators of the issues. Mr. Mendez said he and Mr. McGee are scheduled to do a Governor's briefing regarding RABA on Monday, noting the Governor will be attending a national conference on RABA on Tuesday.

Mr. Biesty reviewed bills currently under consideration at the State Legislature. A written copy of his summary was submitted to the Board.

Chairperson Dusenberry asked what effect the Board's support or opposition to a bill has. Mr. Biesty said the Board is obligated to voice its opposition to a bill if it feels it will negatively impact the state or its citizens and, in that case, he would go before the committee to explain why the agency opposes the bill.

Mr. Biesty pointed out that many of the bills are still under analysis and their ultimate impacts have yet to be determined.

Mr. Lane noted HB 2575 is not revenue neutral. Mr. Biesty agreed. He said he does not believe the bill will pass given its sponsor and the financial implications the Legislature is currently dealing with.

Mr. Biesty provided a copy of the text of HB 2502, stating the agency's position on the bill is neutral.

Mr. Jeffers asked whether the bill's restriction on elected officials serving on the Board would extend to officials elected to positions on school boards, conservation boards and so forth. Mr. Biesty said he does not believe it would, but he will look at the final language.

Mr. Biesty warned that some unreasonable recommendations concerning sound walls could be coming from the ad hoc committee.

### **January 2002 Life Cycle Certification**

Mr. Chuck Eaton explained they certify the Life Cycle Program twice each year. He said the certification represents the status of the program as of November 31, 2001 and does not take the proposed RABA reductions into account. He reviewed the purpose behind the Life Cycle Program and discussed the status of various projects. Mr. Eaton said the certification includes their semi-annual update of construction and right-of-way costs. He reviewed their rationale behind the upgrade of the Red Mountain/Loop 202/US 60 system interchange. He reported reductions in RARF and HURF forecasts of almost \$29 million and \$13 million, respectively. He said the program has been affected by just under \$5 million because fewer bonds were planned than previously programmed. He said they are proposing to include the \$42 million of MAG area discretionary funds in 2007 to help make up the difference of the interchange cost. He stated adding all of the figures together resulted in a net revenue increase of approximately \$4 million.

Mr. Eaton reviewed debt service, explaining Mr. McGee's department reassessed the overall bonding program and identified a calculation that resulted in a \$60 million benefit to the program. He said that correction, along with fewer bonds in earlier years, resulted in a net reduction in debt service of about \$85 million. He explained the discount factor was based on a risk analysis process and resulted in a slightly higher amount being placed in reserve. He said, because of the increased cost of the US 60 interchange, they felt it made sense to add a \$55 million HURF bond issue in 2007. He stated the resulting additional funds totaled approximately \$130 million.

Mr. Eaton stated the \$102 million increase in construction costs can be attributed to the Loop 202 interchange and increases on Grand Avenue projects. He said Right-of-way costs increased \$21 million, most of which was for an additional 60 acres in and around the Red Mountain/US 60 interchange. He pointed out that they are paying a considerable amount beyond the Life Cycle period because of the acceleration of the program.

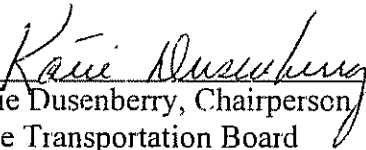

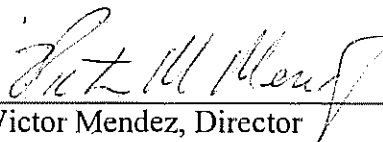
### **Adjournment**

The State Transportation Board met in official session for a regular meeting at 9:00 a.m., Friday, February 15, 2002, with Chairperson Dusenberry presiding. Other Board members present included: Vice Chairperson Ingo Radicke, Rusty Gant, Bill Jeffers, Joe Lane and Jim Martin. Also present were Debra Brisk, Deputy Director; Dick Wright, State Engineer; John McGee, Chief Financial Officer, Administrative Services Division; Gary Adams, Assistant Director, Aeronautics Division and Mary Lynn Tischer, Director, Planning Division. There were approximately 80 people in the audience.

**OPENING REMARKS AND PLEDGE**

Chairperson Dusenberry led the audience in the Pledge of Allegiance. She thanked the City of Globe for their hospitality Thursday night and introduced dignitaries in the audience.

**DISTRICT ENGINEER REPORT**

Rick Powers, Globe District Engineer, updated the Board on projects in the Superior, Roosevelt, Globe/Miami and San Carlos Indian reservation areas. Written copies of his comments were submitted for the record.

**CALL TO AUDIENCE**

Terry Wheeler, Vice Mayor of Globe, thanked Mr. Powers and his staff for the great job they have done in the area. He said the primary goal is to move traffic, but it is important to remember that people live and ranch along the highways. He spoke about the lack of rest stop facilities between Globe and the Salt River Canyon. He said they need a school zone designated on the highway in downtown Globe.

Mary Anne Moreno, Executive Director, South Gila County Economic Development Corporation, said she is glad passing lanes between Superior and Globe are in the planning stages, but she would like to see downhill passing lanes as well.

Brent Billingsley, Deputy Director, Central Arizona Association of Governments, thanked the Board for their support of the CAAG region and for providing non-biased, non-parochial, statewide transportation planning and programming. He thanked Mr. Radicke, in particular, for

his personal sacrifices which have benefited the citizens of Arizona. He commended Mr. Powers and his staff on their hard work.

Councilman Chuck Busby, Town of Quartzsite, said he is extremely happy with the projects that have been completed. He said getting Bypass 10 included in the five year plan would be a big boost to the area. He stated F&F Construction has done a great job on Highway 95 with a minimum number of traffic delays, noting they could complete the project as early as June. He stressed the need for passing lanes on Highway 95 from Yuma to Parker.

Ted Schaefer, Globe resident, stated their economy relies heavily on tourist traffic, noting they are a major bypass for traffic going from the east valley into the White Mountain area. He pointed out that Globe is the largest community served by a two lane highway. He said today's traffic counts warrant having the highways addressed. He complimented the Board for what they have done on Highway 60, stating it will enhance the community both in terms of beauty and safety. He stressed the importance of maintaining highways, noting Highway 60 has not been maintained in over one year.

Councilman Otto Santa Anna, Miami, spoke about the unsafe conditions west of Miami, suggesting they do more to warn travelers that the road narrows to one lane. He spoke about a drain located on his property, noting ADOT does not have an easement on his property. He stated the drain is no longer needed and negatively affects his property value.

Mr. Fernando Shipley, resident of Globe, said his family's safety is at risk every time they travel between Globe and Phoenix. He suggested a divided highway would reduce the potential for head-on collisions and save lives.

### **CONSENT AGENDA**

Item 41 was pulled from the Consent Agenda and put on the regular agenda.

### **Letter from the Board to the Arizona Congressional Delegation regarding Highway Federal Funding reductions**

It was suggested the last sentence in the first paragraph be modified to read "a substantial positive balance to support doing so...". It was also suggested the phrase, "in Arizona we stand to lose..." be modified to read, "Arizona stands to lose...".

**Board Action:** A motion to approve the letter as revised was made by Mr. Jeffers, seconded by Mr. Radicke and passed unanimously.

## DIRECTOR'S REPORT

### **Legislative Report**

Mr. Kevin Betsy said all other business will cease if the state budget agreement is not reached by this weekend. He said the bonding increase bill is close to proceeding to the Governor. He stated the Senate and House are pretty far apart in terms of the budget and the HURF shifts are basically the same as recommended in the Governor's plan.

Mr. Biesty reported a strike everything amendment was offered on HB 2496, wherein Maricopa County was given three representatives, Pima County was given two representatives and the other districts were given four. He explained that the Board's duties would be expanded to include developing and adopting multi-modal transportation policies.

Mr. Gary Adams said HB 2490 and 1372 would set aside \$2 million in the State Aviation Fund to match a federal demonstration program authorized by USDOT this year. He stated the impact of the bill, as written, would result in a \$6 million loss to the five year program. He said they have suggested to those requesting the bill that \$2 million is too much to set aside. He stated there have been discussions about taking money from another source, namely the HURF. He noted the bill passed out of the House Aviation Committee and is being held in the Senate Transportation Committee. He said the Attorney General's office has given their verbal opinion that the State Transportation Board currently has the authority to award airport development grants, reducing the necessity for the bill. He stated they will remain neutral on the bill until the FAA comes forward with guidelines for the program.

Mr. Biesty reported the Planning and Data Collection bill is awaiting committee assignment and SB 1215 failed in its first committee and will be taken off the list.

Mr. Chuck Busby stated most of southwestern Arizona is against changing the makeup of the ADOT Board, noting Quartzsite recently passed a resolution to that effect.

### **Financial Report**

Mr. John McGee reviewed the December 2001 Maricopa Transportation Excise Tax report, stating they collected \$22.1 million for the month. He said year-to-date collections total \$131 million, which is 1.7 percent over last year and 2.6 percent below forecast. He said Retail Sales for the months of November and December were up 3.8 percent, which is the strongest two month showing since last April and May. He stated collections from Contracting remain strong with 18 percent growth over last year. He estimated ending the year \$7 to \$8 million below the forecast of \$280 million for the half-cent sales tax.

Mr. McGee reported January 2002 HURF collections of \$96.2 million, 1.6 percent over last year, but 3.5 percent under the forecast. He noted \$96.2 million is the highest monthly total ever collected in HURF. He stated year-to-date collections total \$609.7 million, approximately 4.5

percent over last year and .09 over forecast. He expressed his opinion that HURF collections for the year will slightly exceed the forecast.

In response to Chairperson Dusenberry's question, Mr. McGee stated no other state has indicated they are seeing the kinds of decreases in gas taxes and other use fees seen at the national level.

Mr. McGee reviewed the Investment Performance Report for December 2001, stating the department earned \$2.668 million. He said year-to-date earnings are about \$19 million with a 4.92 percent average return.

Mr. McGee noted the HELP Fund cash balance decreased almost \$20 million and is now at \$126.7 million. He referred to the State Infrastructure Bank Loan and Loan Agreements by State report dated September 30, 2001. He said Arizona continues to make a good showing in comparison to other states.

### **Financing Program**

Mr. McGee reported the \$76.9 million HURF bond issue priced in January closed successfully on February 6. He said they are now looking at refunding up to \$85 million in HURF bonds previously issued in 1999 and 1992. He reviewed a timetable of events associated with the refunding, noting issue pricing will not occur until the Board and the Department are able to reach an acceptable level of debt service savings based on market conditions. He said they anticipate saving \$2.8 to \$2.9 million in total debt service if the refund pricing is successful.

### **Amendment to Resolution Authorizing Issuance of Highway Revenue Bonds, Series 2002**

Mr. McGee presented and recommended approval of the Amendment to the Resolution adopted December 14, 2001 authorizing issuance of Highway Revenue Bonds, Series 2002. He explained they split the issuances because doing them together as a single pricing did not generate the same level of savings.

**Board Action:** A motion to approve the above recommendation was made by Mr. Radicke, seconded by Mr. Gant and passed unanimously.

### **Appointment of Underwriters, Highway Revenue Bonds, Series 2002A**

Mr. McGee presented and recommended approval of a Resolution recommending appointment of Underwriters for the Board's anticipated issuance of highway Revenue Bonds Series 2002A.

**Board Action:** A motion to approve the following Resolution was made by Mr. Radicke and seconded by Mr. Gant.

Mr. McGee reported the GAO audit has not yet been released. He said a \$600 million error was found, therefore the \$5 billion negative RABA adjustment has been readjusted down to a -\$4.4 billion.

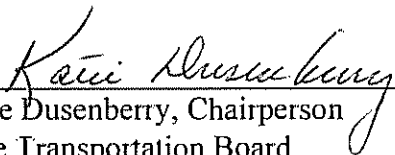

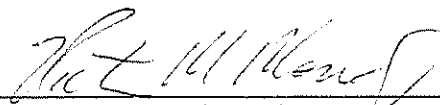
