



No need to rush!

Current Arizona credentials are good until Oct. 1, 2020.

The Arizona Voluntary Travel ID is the credential that complies with the federal REAL ID Act of 2005. The Voluntary Travel ID is available as both a driver license and an identification card. As its name suggests, Arizona residents will have the option to obtain a Voluntary Travel ID.

Arizona Voluntary Travel ID





The Voluntary Travel ID will serve as valid identification to pass through airport security to board commercial aircraft within the U.S. as well as access restricted areas in federal facilities, nuclear power plants and military bases.



Voluntary Travel ID applicants must apply in person. For faster service, submit an application online in advance of your visit. Fill one out at azdot.gov/DriverLicenseInfo.

Current Arizona driver license holders:

- ▶ Go anytime to an Authorized Third Party Driver License provider. Locations at azdot.gov/thirdpartyDLservices.
- ▶ Or visit select MVD offices by appointment only. Appointments must be scheduled at ServiceArizona.com.


First-time or renewal driver license applicants:

- ▶ Go anytime to an Authorized Third Party Driver License provider. Locations at azdot.gov/thirdpartyDLservices.
- ▶ Or, visit an MVD office. Locations at azdot.gov/locations.



Those who choose to get a Voluntary Travel ID will need certain documents to apply (samples below; full list available at azdot.gov/TravelID):

- ▶ **One document to establish citizenship or legal presence:** Certified birth certificate, valid U.S. passport or valid immigration documents
- ▶ **One document to confirm Social Security information:** Social Security card or W-2 form
- ▶ **Two documents to establish proof of residency:** Bank statement, utility bill or Arizona Voter Registration Card.



The Voluntary Travel ID is valid for a maximum of eight years. Exceptions do apply including drivers age 65 or older whose licenses are currently valid for five years. For non-U.S. citizens who have authorized legal presence, the expiration date will be based on the immigration documents presented, not to exceed eight years.



The cost of a Voluntary Travel ID is \$25 (initial application and renewal).



There's no rush! The U.S. Department of Homeland Security is expected to extend the use of all Arizona credentials (both federally-compliant and non-compliant) at airport security stations, restricted federal buildings and military bases until Oct. 1, 2020. This gives residents who would like a Voluntary Travel ID a few years to obtain one.

Anyone who gets a non-compliant driver license or ID card after the Voluntary Travel ID is available will receive a credential with the phrase "Not for federal identification" marked on it. It's important to note that these credentials are still good for airport security and federal building access until Oct. 1, 2020.
